



Daughters of the Nile, founded in 1913, is a benevolent global fraternal organization for women 18 years of age or older, who are related by birth or marriage to a Shriner, Master Mason, or Daughter of the Nile; or a Majority Member in Good Standing of a Masonic-related organization for girls; or who was a patient, with or without Shrine or Masonic relationship, at a Shriners Hospitals for Children.

There are 132 Temples (what our local groups are called) throughout the United States, Canada and most recently Brazil. In Indiana, we have four Temples, located in Evansville, Fort Wayne, Indianapolis and Terre Haute. **Koran Temple in Indianapolis is the proud sponsor of this year's "LOVE ON THE GO!" tree in the Indiana Historical Society's Festival of Trees.**

Koran Temple meets at the Murat Shrine on North New Jersey Street. The Murat Shrine has a long history of benevolence not only in Indianapolis, but also in working to help the children in the hospitals we serve. The Nobles of Murat Shrine give monetarily, and also through providing transportation to children and their families to the hospitals for treatment, taking donated items like the sewing items and toys to the hospitals, and hosting social engagements like the Christmas party for the local patients helped by Shriners Hospitals.

Members of Daughters of the Nile are proud to work with Shriners International in supporting the 22 Shriners Hospital locations, as well as telehealth sites, outreach programs, and community clinics in the United States, Canada, and Mexico. Since its inception in 1913, Daughters of the Nile has contributed more than 64 million dollars, the second largest continuous contributing donor – second only to the Shriners themselves.
