## Are you inspired by what you have seen and heard?

Visit the William H. Smith Memorial Library on the second level of the History Center. Ask the library staff to pull these collections containing material related to Eva Kor and the Jewish experience in Indiana:

- Eva Mozes Kor Collection, ca. 1930s-2019, M1492. Contains materials donated by Eva Kor's son, Alex Kor, including correspondence, photographs and other documents related to Eva's work as an activist and educator.
- Jewish Federation of Indianapolis records, 1880-ongoing, M0463. Contains records, correspondence and printed materials of the Jewish Welfare Federation and predecessor organizations.
- Jewish newsletters collections, M1101 and M1102. Contains biographical information on Esther Lask, a holocaust survivor, and newsletters from the Jewish community.

- Indiana Jewish Historical Society Collection, 1845-2002, M0743. Contains records from around Indiana including publications, organizational minutes and correspondence.
