BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Aaron S. Bullard was born on November 3, 1799 in Franklin County, Massachusetts to Isaac Bullard and Martha Bullard. He and his wife Mary (Dolph) married in 1821 in Jennings County, Indiana and had five children. His children were Joseph R. Bullard (1824-1874), Justus Bullard (1829-1908), Eunice Bullard (Tooley) (1831-1900), Martha Bullard (Christopher) (1834-1887), and Sarah Bullard (Duckworth) (1841-1910). He and his family are listed in the 1830 and 1840 census as living in Jennings County, Indiana. He was a farmer for the duration of his life. He died on June 2, 1852, possibly from bilious fever and ague and is buried in Decatur County, Indiana. He writes in his letter that many in his family are sick on April 11 of that year.
