#### **BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH**

John H. Rerick (1830–1911) was born in Tippecanoe County, Indiana, and received a medical degree from the University of Michigan in 1853. He practiced in LaGrange, Lagrange County, Indiana, and was instrumental in the formation of the 44<sup>th</sup> Indiana Regiment at the outbreak of the Civil War. Rerick was commissioned Assistant Surgeon in the regiment in December 1861. Rerick was promoted to Surgeon in August 1863 and served with the regiment at the battles of Shiloh, Stones River, Missionary Ridge and Chickamauga.

After he was mustered out in September 1865, Rerick returned to LaGrange and in 1867 purchased the LaGrange Standard. Rerick and his family operated the paper until October 1928 except for the years 1869–1872. He was also elected Clerk of the Lagrange Circuit Court in 1868. Rerick married Marinanett Deaver in May 1856, and together they had three children.

### **SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE**

The majority of this collection is comprised of the letters written by John H. Rerick to his wife, Marinanett, while serving as a surgeon in the 44<sup>th</sup> Indiana letter during the Civil War, 1861–1865. The bulk of Rerick's correspondence to his wife is from the years 1861 and 1865. Most of the letters from 1861 were written from Camp Allen in Fort Wayne (September–November) describing his arrival and preference for the regimental surgeon, and his desire to be part of the medical as well as describing patients in the hospital. Later letters come from Indianapolis, Evansville, and Camp Reed in Henderson, Kentucky. These contain information about daily routines, the caring for the sick, and the first indications of battle, and being part of a search party in Henderson, Kentucky. He also writes on Christmas Day including a description of dinner. In his 1862 letters he writes from the battlefield at Shiloh, Corinth Mississippi, and various locations in Tennessee and Kentucky. He tells of the treating casualties, and engagements and activities of the 44<sup>th</sup>. Letters written in 1865 are from the brigade hospital in Chattanooga, Tennessee, and speak of more general topics including his disappointment of not being sent home for his illness.

In his 1863 diary he writes of an illness and being granted a leave and the fighting at the Battle of Chickamauga. Entries from the 1864 diary contain the regiment's movements and the loaning and borrowing of money.

Other materials from Rerick's Civil War duty include orders, reports and official correspondence. Included are sick reports, an order exonerating Rerick being AWOL, July 1863; receipts for hospital stores; rosters; and an order naming Rerick recruiting officer in LaGrange, Indiana, January 1864.

The majority of the Rerick family correspondence consists of letters from their sons while studying at the University of Michigan, 1878–1880. The collection also contains John Rerick's medical writings on such topics as Scarlet Fever and Asphyxia. There is also a photocopy of a genealogical chart compiled by Rerick in 1870. Also included are photographs of many members of the 44<sup>th</sup> Indiana and other Civil War soldiers as well as a large number of family photographs, 1860s–1890s., and buttons presumably from his uniform.
