## **BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH**

The Taggart and Eaglesfield Family Papers document the life of Margaret Townsend Eaglesfield Taggart. However, the collection also contains correspondence from her parents, aunts, grandparents, and even great-grandparents on the Eaglesfield side of the family.

Margaret Townsend Eaglesfield Taggart or “Towney” (December 9, 1922—September 28, 2004) was born to Robert Davy and Patricia Hobson Eaglesfield in Indianapolis, Indiana. She was the youngest child in the family, with an older brother, Robert Davy Jr. and an older sister, Patricia. Taggart attended Orchard School, Tudor Hall (Park Tudor), and Shortridge High School, where she took an interest in theatre and singing. She did not initially have any interest in going to college, but her aunt, Carina Eaglesfield Milligan, convinced her to look into Finch College, where she began taking classes in 1942, studying Theatre Arts. While at Finch, Taggart worked at a radio station, and briefly sang on the Xavier Cugat Show. In addition, she worked at the American Theatre Wing’s Stage Door Canteen and the Merchant Marine Canteen. Taggart moved back to Indianapolis in 1944 and in July 1945, Taggart married Lt. Wendell Deardorff Little, Jr.; they divorced in 1946. In 1949, Taggart met an Indiana University student, Gregorio Delint, who was from Mexico City, Mexico. They were married, and lived in Mexico City, where Taggart had her first child, Gregorio (Greg). The family came back to Indianapolis in 1951, when Taggart had her second child, Maria. Taggart and Delint divorced, and Taggart married Henry Gordon Taggart, who adopted Greg and Maria. The Taggarts divorced in 1965. Taggart was employed variously as a stenotype reporter, a sales assistant with General Electric, and a membership representative with AAA Hoosier Motor Club. Taggart was also involved with various organizations, such as the Indianapolis Woman’s Club, and especially with the General Arthur St. Clair Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution. Taggart was also an avid genealogist, who along with her mother, Patricia, compiled genealogies for both the Hobson and Eaglesfield branches of family.

## **SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE**

Series 1 pertains to the Taggart Family, Henry, Townsend, Maria, and Greg. The majority of the items belonged to Townsend, from her personal correspondence to her social interests writing essays for the Indianapolis Women's Club and involvement as an alumnus of Orchard School and Finch College. There are also a few personal documents belonging to Townsend's third husband, Henry Taggart, and her children Maria and Greg.

Series 2 pertains to members of four generations of the Eaglesfield family. Most of the items are personal correspondence between family members. In addition, there are some memoirs and essays and clippings from the works of Carina Campbell Eaglesfield, who was a published author. There are also a few items relating to Robert Davy Eaglesfield's manufacturing business.

Series 3 pertains to items from Townsend E. Taggart and her mother Patricia Hobson Eaglesfield's involvement with the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) and the National Society of the Colonial Dames of America. There are yearbooks, supplements, and correspondence from the local DAR Chapter, the General Arthur St. Clair Chapter, as well as the state and national organizations. There are also publications and correspondence relating to the Colonial Dames.

Series 4 pertains to genealogy, which was compiled by both Townsend E. Taggart and her mother, Patricia Hobson Eaglesfield. The materials cover both the Eaglesfield side of the family and the Hobson side of the family.

Series 5 pertains to black and white photographs. Many of these photographs are associated with the various family genealogies. In addition, there are photos of Robert Davy and Patricia Hobson Eaglesfield and their three children, Robert Jr., Patricia, and Margaret Townsend. Also in this series are Townsend E. Taggart's wedding portraits from her first wedding, and photos of her children Maria and Greg.

Series 6 pertains to color photographs, mostly relating to Townsend E. Taggart and her children.
