BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Emmett I. Brown (1918–1959) was born in Indianapolis and educated at Tennessee A. and I. University (now Tennessee State University) at Nashville, where he was chaplain of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity. In the late 1940's he opened his photography shop in the Hoosier capitol, "The Brown Show Case," at 808 Indiana Avenue. A strategic site at the time, it was the entertainment corridor of the Avenue. There Brown succeeded in recording images of the great and near-great musicians and celebrities who visited Indianapolis and Indiana Avenue.

In the mid-1950's Brown and his family moved to Chattanooga, Tennessee, where he assumed editorial duties for *Sepia Frame* magazine, a photo journal which depicted the achievements of African-Americans—perhaps best described as "a first cousin" to *Ebony* magazine. After a brief spell with *Sepia*, the Hoosier-born Brown returned to Indianapolis in 1956, established his home at 3518 Schofield Ave., south of the State Fairgrounds, and assumed duties as Associate Pastor of the Martindale Ave. Church of Christ where his father served as the Senior Pastor. Still a photographer at heart, the bespectacled Brown established a new studio at Martindale and 19th streets where he concentrated on portrait and freelance photography. Open-heart surgery (1958) probably contributed to his death the following year on September 9, at the local General Hospital. Interment followed in Floral Park Cemetery, Indianapolis, on the city's west side. His wife, Alta Jean, two sons and two daughters survived him.

Indiana Avenue began to take shape at the close of the Civil War. In the early 20th century, as Southern migrants moved into the area, whites moved out. The area developed its own government and ethos, even after Prohibition (1919) and the stock market crash a decade later. Most of the Avenue's residents held unskilled jobs, but there were also a number of professionals and entrepreneurs. Whatever the class structure, residents looked with increasing pride at what they saw along the strip, an area which increasingly took on a life of its own with its residential units, restaurants, saloons, night clubs, groceries, barber and hair stylists, tailors, morticians, as well as physicians and lawyers, and one photographer—Emmett I. Brown.

SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

The collection contains mostly negatives, with a few original and copy photographs made by African American photographer Emmett I. Brown Jr., taken between ca. 1940 and 1959.

Researchers will find images of the great and near-great in jazz music, including Willis Dyer, Hammond organ artist and Buddy Parker and his tenor sax; Milt Buckner, the piano and organ wizard; Jimmy Cleveland, the trombone virtuoso who played with Lionel Hampton and recorded with Dizzy Gillespie; Les Fisher, the Michigan born drummer who later beat out the rhythms with Count Basie and who credited his father for his drumming skills and his mother for his vocal and composing acumen (Fisher played at George's Bar, next door to "Brown's Show Case" shop); the Hampton Sisters, products of Indianapolis' own jazz milieu; and the Ohio-born Mills Brothers (plus their father, John).

In addition to musicians, Brown's collection also includes images of Brown family members, local churches, and notable people in the African American community. There are images of Dr. Francis Hummons, a graduate of DePauw University and later a well known physician in Indianapolis; Mercer Mance a pioneer black judge; T.R. Murff, an itinerant evangelist. There are also images of nationally known boxers, Joe Louis and Sugar Ray Robinson (born Walker Smith, Jr.).

The collection was organized by the processors into series by general subjects and the negatives and photographs were numbered to maintain the order. The numbers are listed in square brackets in the Contents section of the collection guide with names and brief descriptions.
