BIOGRAPHICAL AND HISTORICAL SKETCHES

American artist, **Jessie Hull Mayer** (1910–2009) was born in New Haven, Connecticut and grew up on Long Island Sound in Branford, Connecticut. She enrolled in the Yale School of Fine Arts and graduated with a bachelor's degree in fine arts. While at Yale, she met and married fellow art student Henrik Martin Mayer in 1932. The couple lived in New York City for a year before moving to Indianapolis, Indiana, where Henrik was newly hired as assistant director at the John Herron Art Institute in 1934.

In 1935, both Jessie and Henrik submitted designs for the competition of the Lafayette, Indiana post office mural. Henrik won that first mural commission with Jessie being the runner up. Over the next four years Jessie submitted and won four more post office mural designs; three in Indiana and one in Missouri. When WWII began, the public art program ended.

While in Indianapolis, Jessie worked at the John Herron Art Museum as an artist and teacher. In 1946, the couple moved to Essex, Connecticut, where Henrik had accepted the position as director of the Hartford Art School of the Wadsworth Athaneum. For the remainder of her career, Jessie worked as a commercial artist in retail advertising and continued to paint watercolors of flowers and marine subjects.

Lucy Martha Taggart (1880–1960) was the daughter of noted Indiana Democratic politician and businessman Thomas Taggart. Lucy studied art with many notable artists in the East and Europe and exhibited her paintings widely. She was especially noted for her work in portraits. In 1931, she began teaching at the John Herron Art Institute and remained on the faculty as a painting and portrait instructor until 1943. It was during this time period that both Taggart and Jessie Hull Mayer were at Herron and the portrait of Mayer was completed.

Gregory E. Mescha was an art collector from Baltimore, Maryland, who acquired Jessie Hull Mayer's design painting for the Jasper, Indiana, post office mural.

Indiana Post Office Murals: In 1934 during the Depression, Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau, Jr. established a new arts program known as the Section of Painting and Sculpture. The Section's purpose was to provide artistic decoration for public buildings across the United States and provide financial relief for artists.

Because of their public access, post offices were chosen as the ideal location for the placement of murals. Open competitions were held for artists requiring that they either live in or were born in the state for which they were submitting a mural design. Thirty-seven of these mural commissions were created for Indiana post offices, with thirty-six remaining today.

SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

The collection is arranged in two series.

The first series is comprised of research materials and photographs collected by art dealer, Gregory E. Mescha. They document his research on tracking down the artist Jessie Hull Mayer, and the history of her winning mural design for the Jasper, Indiana post office. The painting was once owned by the Treasury Department until it was given to an employee who later sold it to Mescha.

The second series contains Jessie Hull Mayer's original design painting for the Jasper, Indiana Post Office mural titled, *Indiana Farm*. Created in 1938, her winning design depicts an autumn day on an Indiana farm. Farmers are seen loading pumpkins onto a horse drawn wagon while the farmer's wife opens a letter at the mail box. Children, cows, a house, barns, and trees are all part of the scenery.

The second series also contains a profile portrait of Jessie Hull Mayer drawn in pastels by Indiana artist Lucy Martha Taggart. The portrait was done while both women were working at the John Herron Art Institute in Indianapolis. It was donated as a gift of A. Thompson Ellwanger III in honor of Gregory E. Mescha.
