## HISTORICAL SKETCH

The Logan Grays was an independent company of militia organized in Logansport, Cass County, Indiana, on 13 July 1874 by Captain Dudley H. Chase. Chase was commander of the company for many years, and then was succeeded by his son, Captain Will Chase, until the organization disbanded on 13 May 1895. During its years of existence, the Logan Grays had a total of 381 members.

The company had its armory in Richardson's Hall at 427 Market Street in Logansport. It regularly drilled in military maneuvers. It was considered the best-drilled and most soldierly appearing company in Indiana. The Logan Grays made many full-dress appearances in parades on occasions such as George Washington's birthday, Decoration Day (now known as Memorial Day), and Independence Day.

In August 1876, Governor Thomas A. Hendricks called on the Logan Grays and others to be in Indianapolis to intervene in possible trouble stemming from striking workers from the Ohio and Mississippi Railway. On 1 December 1885, the company participated in the extensive funeral cortege for Vice President Thomas A. Hendricks in Indianapolis.

On 13 July 1899, a reunion picnic to celebrate the silver anniversary of the Logan Grays' founding was held in Spencer Park, just south of the Eel River, in Logansport. The event was planned by Judge Dudley H. Chase, the organization's founder.
