BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Born October 5, 1951 Paula Michelle Parker-Sawyers (Means) has worked in philanthropy and civics leadership in Indianapolis for over forty years. She obtained a B.A. in Political Science from Indiana University in 1980 and an M.P.A. in Non-Profit Management from Indiana University-Indianapolis in 2003. In 1982 she married James E. Sawyers with whom she remained married until his death in 2006. She has three children, one step-child, and multiple grandchildren. She married David A. Means in 2013 and took his surname.

In the 1970s and 1980s she worked in civics, first as secretary for Congressman Elwood H. Hillis from 1971–73 and then Congressman William H. Hudnut III from 1973–74. In 1976 she was elected to the city county council, beginning her civic career, where she served until 1983. In 1989 she was the first woman appointed as Deputy Mayor under Mayor William H. Hudnut III.

Her philanthropic career is extensive. She worked in leadership roles for philanthropic and public health organizations, and served on countless boards for the private and non-profit sector. In the 1990s Parker-Sawyers served as Director of the Associated Group (1991–93), Director of the Leadership Works program at the IU Center for Philanthropy (1993–98), Executive Director of Association of Black Foundation Executives (1997–99), and Director of Office of Neighborhood Resources at Indiana University-Purdue University of Indianapolis (1999–2000). In the 2000s she served as Director of Friendly Access, a program of the Health and Hospital Corporation (2000–01), Associate Director of the Polis Center at IUPUI (2001–05), Executive Director of Office of Faith Based and Community Initiatives (2005–08), and Director of Outreach and Programming for the National Campaign to Prevent Teen and Unplanned Pregnancy (2008–2013). In 2015 she was appointed to her current position as Missions Director for the Tabernacle Presbyterian Church. Board membership that Parker-Sawyers has served includes the Pacers Foundation, National Coalition of 100 Black Women, Indiana Perinatal Network, United Way of Central Indiana, and Spirit and Place Festival, among others.

Materials in the collection

SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

This collection comprises papers from Paula Parker-Sawyers philanthropic and civic career. The majority of the material is from the 1990s and 2000s and represents her work on multiple organizational boards.

Series 1: Paula Parker-Sawyers and James E. Sawyers, 1976–2016

The first series contains Parker-Sawyers personal and biographical information, including a copy of her detailed resume, as of 2016. When acquired, the collection included a scrapbook of her late husband James E. Sawyer. The photographs and newspaper clippings contained within the scrapbook were removed and placed in folders for preservation. This series also includes photographs featuring Paula Parker-Sawyers, James E. Sawyers, William H. Hudnut III, Fred Madorin, and "Sugar" Poindexter.

Series 2: Speeches, Papers, Teaching Materials, and Conferences, 1993–2002

Series 2 is made up of speeches, papers, teaching materials, correspondence, and ephemera relating to conferences where Parker-Sawyers presented. The bulk of the series contains teaching materials for IU Center on Philanthropy's Fund Raising School curriculum program, Leadership Works, which provided non-profit Board training.

Series 3: Organizations and Projects, 1986–2004

The bulk of the collection is contained within series 3 and is made up of board meeting minutes, correspondence, and ephemera for private and non-profit organizations for which Parker-Sawyers worked. They are arranged alphabetically by name of organization.

Series 4: Resources, 1986–2001

The final series contains resource material, newspaper clippings, and research papers related various organizations for which Parker-Sawyers may not have been involved. Topics include diversity, public healthcare, youth development, and philanthropy.

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
