HISTORICAL SKETCH

The US government first issued adhesive postage stamps on 1 July 1847. Before that time, mail delivery was usually paid for by the receiving person. The use of pre-paid stamps was made mandatory in 1855. After the Civil War, as the variation in stamps increased, the hobby of collecting them grew steadily. By 1886, a committee had formed to plan a national organization for postal stamp enthusiasts (or philatelists). The American Philatelist Association was established in September. By the 1890s, the Post Office had realized that it could increase revenue by issuing special collectible stamps, often in commemoration of an event.

After President Warren G. Harding's unexpected death in 1923, a publisher in Ohio created a special graphic, or cachet, for envelopes, or covers, to memorialize the president. In this case it was five lines of simple text stamped in black. More elaborate cachets followed, and these also became collected by philatelists. Soon the Post Office began issuing special covers for the first day a commemorative stamp was issued.
