#### **BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH**

Powell Howland (1799–1878) was born in Saratoga, New York, but moved to northeast Marion County, Indiana, in October 1838, where he purchased a 160-acre farm from Benjamin Johnson. He eventually increased his land holdings to 315 acres and operated several gravel toll road companies. Howland was also politically active, serving as a county commissioner and a representative to the state legislature as a member of the Democratic Party. He was also instrumental in the development of public education in Indiana and donated one-half acre of his land for the erection of a school. Howland also served as a trustee of the Marion County Library for thirty years, nineteen as president of the board. Howland married Mahala Thurber in 1823 and they produced nine children. One of their daughters, Pamelia, married Oliver Johnson in 1843.

#### SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

The collection consists of Powell Howland's personal and business papers. Personal materials (Series 1) include letters between Howland and his father, Elisha, in Waterford and Mechanicsville, New York, 1841–57. These letters primarily discuss health, finances, weather, farming, and general family news. There also are letters from friends in New York and Indiana concerning personal and financial matters, 1851–70, as well as letters from Howland's

granddaughter, Mary E. Lowe, in Marshfield, Missouri, concerning the financing of a land purchase, 1872. Other items of a personal nature include a day/memorandum book, 1822–24; a Civil War-era claim for damages done to his farm by Union soldiers, 1863; a catalog of his nursery, ca. 1840s; Howland's will and insurance policies, 1860s–70s; school papers of Maggie Howland, n.d.; a letter announcing a meeting of the Marion County Library, 1861; and family correspondence and papers, 1891–1917.

Powell's general business papers (Series 2) chiefly contain land records such as deeds, mortgages, indentures/agreements, and tax records, 1841–76. Also included are correspondence regarding estates and land deeds and payments of debts, in particular the estate of Elisha Howland in Saratoga, New York, and the accounts of Knowlton Howland in Marshall County, Indiana. Additional items include Howland's personal account and memorandum books, 1840–78, detailing his various business dealings with individuals. The papers also contain the articles of incorporation for the Simmons Edge Tool Company of Indianapolis, which manufactured axes, tools, iron, and steel, 1873. Additional business-related items include a large number of receipts and cancelled checks from a variety of areas and services, 1841–77.

The collection's two largest areas of concentration are the records of Howland's gravel road companies (Series 5) and the papers related to his involvement in the public school system in Marion County and Indiana (Series 6). The largest group of gravel toll road records is those of the Indianapolis and Fall Creek Gravel Road Company, 1842–77. Items include correspondence, tax receipts, vouchers, land acquisition, and general financial information including tolls, diagrams and corporation minutes. Similar, but less voluminous records exist for the Millersville Gravel Road Company, 1858–75; the Fall Creek and Warren Township Gravel Road Company, 1865–69; and the Fall Creek and Mud Creek Gravel Road Company, 1869. There also are records concerning the location of roads, 1869 and 1875, and plank roads, 1860–66. The papers also contain a significant number of records pertaining to the early development of the public school system in Marion County and Indiana and reflect on Howland's position as a county commissioner involved with public education. Education records include trustee's reports, 1831–51; petitions for public schools, 1832–39; forms listing names of children eligible for public schools, 1832–53; bonds, 1832–53; election results for school commissioners, 1845–51; and school commissioner's orders, 1838–53.
