## BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Frances Connecticut Stout was born in 1906, and her sister Anna Paige Stout was born in 1908. Both girls grew up with their parents Alex and Patsy Stout in Indianapolis, Indiana. For the Stout sisters, the two major aspects of their lives were education and religion.

Both women were avid learners. Frances received a Master of Arts from Butler University and a second Master of Arts from the University of Illinois. Afterwards, she started working at the Indianapolis Public Schools (IPS) system as a teacher in English and Spanish. Much of her teaching career was spent at Crispus Attucks High School where she spent her last fifteen years as head of the school's foreign language department. Anna, meanwhile, received an undergraduate degree from Wilberforce University and later a Master's degree from Butler University. She went on to work for the IPS system as a social worker and also served as department head of social work at Valparaiso University. Both women retired in 1973 after each serving over forty years as educators.

Another prominent aspect of the Stout sisters' lives was religion. Both ladies were active members of Bethel African Methodist Episcopal (A.M.E.) Church in Indianapolis, Indiana. Frances, for instance, served as a secretary of the Board of Stewards, a secretary of the Church Conference, a Church Leader, and as Bethel's longtime historian/archivist. Anna, meanwhile, served as a Bethel Trustee, a superintendent of Sunday schools, and as a member of the Indiana Conference of the A.M.E. church.

Outside of religious and educational activities, Frances and Anna were involved in various social organizations, including the National Council of Negro Women, Flanner House, and Alpha Kappa Alpha (AKA) sorority. Frances, in fact, was one of the founders of the Alpha Mu Omega chapter in Indianapolis, which was established 16 February 1929. She remained active in the sorority for over 75 years.

Anna Stout died on 10 July 1989, while Frances Stout died on 19 January 2004.

## SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

The Stout Family Papers are divided into five series:

Series One contains Frances and Anna Stout's personal materials, which include correspondence, certificates, and photographs.

Series Two covers education material such as the sisters' university class notes, workshop/conference notes, lesson plans, and other teaching aids (particularly for foreign language training). There are also several documents related to Crispus Attucks High School and the Indianapolis Public Schools (IPS) system, including administrative minutes, teacher bulletins, graduation programs, and directories.

Series Three contains Bethel A.M.E. Church materials, including various board minutes, conference reports, financial records, worship guides, and programs from church activities.

Series Four, A.M.E. Church materials, includes conference minutes and programs, financial reports, and publications from various bodies of the larger African Methodist Episcopal organization. This section is organized by body/entity: General (Connectional) Conference, Fourth Episcopal District (which includes Indiana churches like Bethel), Indiana Conference (which once again includes Bethel), Women's Missionary Society, Lay Organization, and Christian Education. These last three groups are subdivided into Indiana Conference, Fourth District, and General Conference.

Series Five contains miscellaneous materials that do not fit into the first four categories.
