### HISTORICAL SKETCH

William Henry Heign founded his blacksmith company in Wolcottville, Indiana, in 1881. In June 1905 he moved his family to Kendallville, Noble County, Indiana, and relocated his blacksmith shop there at the end of North Main Street. The business adapted to changing times and eventually became Heign Welding Shop. After 125 years in business, the company received a Century Business Award from the Indiana Historical Society in 2006.

William Henry Heign (1862–1951) began his career by working in his father's blacksmith shop in Waterloo, DeKalb County, Indiana. In 1881, at the age of nineteen, William bought the blacksmith shop belonging to Walter H. Rodgers in Wolcottville. After twenty years, the business employed eleven men. It also did woodworking and manufactured buggies in addition to blacksmithing.

After the move to Kendallville, the shop employed nine men. With the introduction of automobiles, the shop switched from making carriages and wagons to working on automobiles and then went into electric and acetylene welding.

William's grandson, Paul Heign, joined the company in 1926. At that time, the business centered on farm machinery, spring repairs, and auto and garage work. In the 1930s they began doing radiator repairs.

Paul Heign took over the business by 1950 and expanded into construction work. A portable welder built by the Heigns during this period was the first such unit in the area. In 1952 the company moved to 701 N. Krueger Street in Kendallville and changed its name to Heign Welding Shop. Steel fabrication had become an important part of the business.

Paul Heign retired in 1985 at age 75. He sold the business to Marion Becker (1945–2024) and Bruce Coney. By then, Becker had been working for Heign for ten years. Becker bought Coney's share of the business in 1992. Becker owned and operated the company for thirty years.
