#### **BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH**

William S. Brown was born in Jennings County in 1831, the third of seven children of John M. and Jane (McGill) Brown. In 1856, he married Elizabeth Waldorff, the fourth of nine children of William and Amy (Welliner) Waldorff. The two settled in the small community of Scipio. On 30 August 1862, William mustered into the 82<sup>nd</sup> Indiana Infantry. The 82<sup>nd</sup> saw action at Perryville, Stones River, and Chickamauga before participating in General W. T. Sherman's Atlanta Campaign, the March to the Sea, and Carolinas Campaign. Brown was promoted to 1<sup>st</sup> Sergeant and again to 1st Lieutenant during his service. He was discharged for disability on 9 April 1865.

This collection consists primarily of 73 letters written between husband and wife William S. and Elizabeth Brown during William's service in the Civil War. Most are letters from William to Elizabeth. Finally, four G.A.R. receipts and one Quartermaster's report from Post No. 479 dated 1888-1889.
