BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCHES

William Zike and Mary Phares Zike and their extended family of descendants lived primarily in Morristown in Shelby County and in Greenfield in Hancock County, Indiana. Surnames of their descendants include Johnson, Carpenter, Boots, Evans, Ramsey, Barr, and Faurot. Surnames of relatives of the Johnson family include Parish and Rock.

William Zike was born in Kentucky on 15 February 1821. In October 1845, he married Mary Phares (1829–1874) in Shelby County, Indiana. They had at least nine children: Sarah Frances (Carpenter) (1846–1907); Mary Susan (Boots) (1849–1937); William Riley Zike (1850–1908); Robert C. Zike (1855–1918); Roscoe Wyatt Zike (1859–1905); Hannibal Harrison Zike (1861–1924); Judilla (Johnson) (1865–1945); Charles P. Zike (1867–1948); and Joseph Addison Zike (1873–1940).

William Zike was a farmer, who lived in the area of Morristown at the time the census was taken in 1850, 1860, and 1870. He was widowed in 1874. The 1880 census shows him farming in Center Township in Hancock County. In April 1886, William married the widowed Anna Mariah Kynes Linville (1845–1927) in Shelbyville. She had a daughter, Arabella “Belle” Linville (1862–1941). The 1900 census lists William as a retired farmer, living in Morristown. William died there on 9 April 1910.

Sarah Frances Zike Carpenter was born on 25 October 1846 in Shelby County. In May 1866, she married William H. Carpenter (born in 1827), a Missouri physician who had children from a previous marriage. William and Sarah’s children included: (Dr.) Alonzo Leorig Carpenter (1868–1937); Walter Scott Carpenter (1869–1929); Nellie (born ca. 1874); and Clara (Nordyke) (1878–1935). Their first child was born in Indiana, but the rest were born in Missouri. Sarah died in Jasper County, Missouri, on 5 December 1907.

Mary Susan “Sue” Zike Boots was born on 5 January 1848 in Shelby County. In September 1867, she married Samuel Sells Boots (1846–1917), a physician. They made their home in Greenfield. Their children included: Austin Perry Boots (1870–1932); Lenora Boots (Ramsey) (1872–1951); and Ralph Raymond Boots (1884–1944). Another child, Samuel S. Boots, Jr., died at six months old. Sue died on 15 September 1937 in Greenfield.

Dr. Samuel Sells Boots was born in Ohio on 12 August 1846 to Joseph Boots and Sophia Sells Boots. In 1865, the family moved to Shelby County, Indiana. In 1866, Samuel began training in the practice of medicine with J. W. Parish, a prominent physician in Shelbyville. In 1867 Samuel began three years of study at the Eclectic Medical Institute at Cincinnati. Soon after graduation, he opened his medical practice in Greenfield in 1870. After he retired as a physician, he began farming and also became editor and manager of the *Greenfield Herald* newspaper for about five years. Samuel died on 30 November 1917 in Hancock County.

Lenora Boots Ramsey was born on 23 December 1872 in Greenfield. She married Dr. Rolla B. Ramsey (1868–1958) in April 1890. They lived in Greenfield, where they raised two children: George Boots Ramsey (1892–1950) and Lois Susan Ramsey (Faurot Revilee Chaplin) (1895–1979). By 1920, Lenora and Rolla had moved to Wayne County, and were raising their niece, Mary June Boots, as a foster child. Lenora died on 19 March 1951 in Richmond.

Lois Susan Ramsey was born on 6 August 1895. She was married and widowed three times. She wed Paul Faurot (1895–1923) in April 1915 in Louisville, Kentucky. They farmed in Wilkinson in Hancock County, Indiana. They had two daughters: Anna Lou (Ford) (1916–2004) and Lenore Emmogene (Floyd) (1918–1984). Lois married her second husband, Gordon S. Revilee (1897–1960), in December 1926. They made their home in Richmond in Wayne County. Gordon had a daughter, June Eileen Revilee (Wood) (1917–1989) from a previous marriage. Lois married her third husband, Arthur Fletcher Chaplin (1887–1976) in 1968. Lois died in Richmond on 1 February 1979.

Anna “Anne” Lou Faurot was born on 21 May 1916 in Wilkinson. She attended Hagerstown High School in Wayne County. She married Charles Russell Ford (1909–1981) in August 1935. They lived in Indianapolis and had one daughter, Sharon Lynn Ford (Wiesen) (1938–2006). Anne Faurot Ford died on 9 July 2004 in Indianapolis. She and her husband and daughter were all buried in Greenfield.

Ralph Raymond Boots was born on 31 October 1882. He married Verna Kingen (1888–1915) in March 1906, in Hancock County, where he was a farmer. They had one daughter, Mary June Boots (Rieman Carpenter) (1907–2004). Ralph married his second wife, Ruth Lillian Gorman (1892–1987) in February 1911. They had four children: Gorman Samuel Boots (1914–1986); Ruth Virginia Boots (Colclazier) (1922–2000); Alice Jean Boots (Keltsch) (1925–1971); and George Richard Boots (1927–1987). Ralph died on 13 October 1944 in Greenfield.

Mary June Boots was born on 3 November 1907 in Greenfield. In December 1936, she married Theodore Frank Rieman (1915–1995) in Hancock County. They had two children, Mary Susan (Hubbard) (1937–1997) and Gary (b. 1940). On 11 April 1943, Mary June married her second cousin, Merrell Leroy Carpenter (1904–1978), who was the son of Dr. Alonzo Leorig Carpenter. Mary June’s grandmother, Susan Zike Boots, and Merrell’s grandmother, Sarah Zike Carpenter, were sisters. The wedding took place in the Richmond home of Mary June’s foster parents, who were her aunt and uncle, Lenora Boots Ramsey and Rolla B. Ramsey. Merrell and Mary June lived in Indianapolis and New York City, but by 1950 they had moved to Miami Springs, Florida. Mary June died on 13 June 2004.

Katie Boots Barr was born on 24 May 1894 to Austin Perry Boots and his first wife, Jennie Marts Boots (Warrick). Her parents divorced and both remarried sometime between 1900 and 1910. At the time of the 1910 census, Katie was living with her mother and stepfather in Greenfield. On 6 May 1915, Katie married Harry Burwell Barr (1894–1933) in Louisville, Kentucky. They had a daughter, Martha Jane Barr (1916–1917), and a son, Heizer Burwell Barr (1918–1962), both born in Greenfield. In 1920 the family lived in Greenfield where Harry worked as an automobile salesman. In 1927 they moved to Arizona, where Harry was the proprietor of a gas station. Katie died three years after her husband did, on 21 July 1936 in Tucson, Arizona.

Heizer Burwell Barr was born on 7 November 1918 in Greenfield. “Heizer” was his father’s mother’s maiden name. Heizer was orphaned when he was still a teenager. The 1940 census shows him lodging with another family in Tucson, Arizona, and working as a used car salesman. He enlisted in the Army on 22 May 1942. He married Adeline Dumas ca. 1947, who had a son from a previous marriage. They had two children together: Michael and Merry Kay. Heizer died on 25 January 1962 in Tucson.

William Riley Zike was born on 3 August 1850 in Shelby County and became a farmer. He married Cynthia Ella Talbert (1854–1923) there in November 1871. They had four sons and two daughters: William Warren Zike (1877–1970); Joseph Floyd Zike (1879–1943); Edward E. Zike (1881–1942); Mary E. Zike (Rees) (1883–1956); Mabel Edith Zike (Keaton) (1887–1962); and Paul Talbert Zike (1892–1963). William Riley Zike died on 12 March 1908 in Morristown.

Robert C. Zike was born on 18 August 1855 in Shelby County. In the 1870s he married Minnie Clyde Thomason, but the marriage did not last. In May 1893, Robert married Minnie Coddington in Port Huron, Michigan. He worked selling farm implements. He and his second wife had a daughter, Zola, in 1894. Robert died on 14 August 1918 in Michigan.

Roscoe Wyatt Zike was born in November 1859 in Shelby County. In April 1882, he married Anna Mable Ellis (1864–1933) in Greenfield. They had a daughter, Golden Orlena Zike (Albon), born on 3 February 1887 in Missouri. By 1888, the family was living in Santa Barbara, California. Roscoe worked as a stationary engineer. He died on 12 April 1905 at home in Santa Barbara.

Golden Orlena Zike graduated from high school in Santa Barbara in 1906. In 1910 she was working as a stenographer for a grocery store in Santa Barbara. In March 1914, she married William Thomas Albon (1878–1952) in Cincinnati, Ohio. In 1920, they were living in Cleveland, Ohio, where William was the owner of a meat shop. They had two sons, Thomas John Albon (1915–1946) and Joseph William Albon (1916–1996). By 1930, the family had moved to Santa Barbara, where William was a meat cutter in a meat market. Golden died on 4 October 1978 in Santa Barbara.

Hannibal Harrison Zike was born on 12 July 1861 in Shelby County. In November 1886, he married Fauna “Fannie” Fern Griggs (1861–1942) in Kansas City, Missouri. They had two children, Lena Roberta Zike (Evans) (1887–1976), and William Gerald Zike (1898–1963), both born in Sullivan County, Indiana, where Hannibal farmed. The family still lived there at the time of the 1900 census, but by 1910 they had moved to Morristown. By 1920, they were living in Greenfield, where Hannibal worked as a druggist. Hannibal died on 11 February 1924 in Greenfield.

Lena Roberta Zike Evans, who appears to have gone by her middle name, was born on 1 November 1887. She married Harry Edward Evans (1883–1927) in April 1911 in Shelby County. They had a son, Max Edward Evans (1912–1959). At the time of the 1920 census, they were living with Roberta’s parents and brother in Greenfield. In 1930, Roberta and her mother, Fannie, were both widowed and living together with Max in Greenfield, where Roberta worked in a grocery store. In 1940, Roberta was working in a dry goods store, and her mother was still living with her. Roberta died on 21 October 1976 in Greenfield.

Max Edward Evans was born on 31 March 1912 in Morristown. He married Sarah Madonna Campbell (1912–1958) in 1936. They had two children, Robert (1941–1976) and Diane. Max owned a paint and wallpaper store in Greenfield. Max died from an overdose of barbiturates on 9 July 1959 at his home in Greenfield, apparently despondent following his wife’s death.

William Gerald Zike was born on 19 March 1898. He married Edith Love Higgins (1900–1969) in January 1925. At the time of the 1930 and 1940 censuses, they lived in Shelby County, and he worked as a cash register salesman and then as a gas station attendant, while she worked as a nurse. By 1950 they were divorced and William was living in Phoenix, Arizona, where he was

“experimenting on development of novelty item.” His death certificate states that he was a retired accountant. He died on 10 March 1963 in Indianapolis and was buried in Greenfield. Edith died in Greenfield and was buried in Indianapolis.

Judilla Zike Johnson was born on 19 November 1865 in Shelby County. In March 1887, she married Frank E. Johnson (1865–1949) in Morristown. They had one daughter, May (sometimes spelled Mae) Louise Johnson (Parish Allen) (1892–1952). At the time of the 1900 census, they were living on Virginia Avenue in Indianapolis and Judilla and Frank were both listed as working as printers. By 1910, they had moved to Greenfield, where Frank managed a newspaper office. Judilla died on 29 May 1945 in Greenfield.

There is a photograph in this collection of an infant identified as “Waldo Johnson, 1889.” A record was found in the Indiana WPA (Works Progress Administration) Death Index for a Waldo Johnson who died at the age of ten months on 10 July 1890 in Morristown. His parents’ names were not listed in the index. The 1900 census indicates that Judilla Johnson had given birth to two children but that only one was still living. Waldo was perhaps her baby.

Frank E. Johnson was born on 22 October 1865 in Morristown to Samuel McGrew Johnson (1821–1867) and Zelda Ann Spurrier Johnson (1826–1906). Frank attended Central Normal College in Danville, Indiana, and spent two years teaching in the schools of his home township. For most of his career, however, he worked in the printing and newspaper business. He was co-founder of the *Morristown Sun*, a weekly publication that he edited for several years. He then went to Cleveland, Ohio, where he was on the staff of the *Cleveland Leader*. During his time in Indianapolis, he was in the printing business with Austin Boots, his wife’s nephew. He also worked for the Western Newspaper Union and as a proofreader for the C. E. Pauley Printing Co. in Indianapolis. In Greenfield he worked in the composing room of the Mitchell Printing Company. In 1905, when a local firm was formed by Eugene Davis and Newton R. Spencer to publish the *Greenfield Evening Star*, *The Herald*, and *The Globe*, Frank joined the organization as an editor. In 1908, when Spencer founded *The Reporter*, Frank was its first editor and worked for that Greenfield newspaper until his retirement in January 1941. Frank died in Fountaintown, Shelby County, on 26 July 1949.

May Louise Johnson Parish Allen was born on 25 May 1892 in Morristown. It appears that she was called by her middle name. In July 1911 she married Nolan Lawrence Parish (1890–1946). They had a daughter, Helen Louise Parish (Bradford) (1912–1972). They made their home in Greenfield, where Nolan worked as a tailor for a dry cleaner. Louise was a vocalist for the Greenfield Christian Church.

Confusingly, there are records that show that Nolan married Lela Cleo Burns Spurrier (1893–1940) in 1931 and that on 6 April 1937, Louise married James Leslie Allen, the mayor of Greenfield, in Frankfort, Kentucky. Nolan and Louise are shown living together in Greenfield in the 1930 census. The 1940 census shows a Lawrence (Nolan’s middle name) and Mae Parrish (sic) living together in Muncie, Indiana. This is possibly another couple with similar names, but they are about the right age, and no other census record could be found for Nolan and Louise for 1940. In 1941, Nolan married Mary Elizabeth Woods Stevens. May Louise Johnson Parish Allen died in Greenfield on 27 September 1952.

Helen Louise Parish Bradford was born on 18 May 1912 in Hancock County. She married Lowell Hunter Bradford (1902–1981), an electrician, in June 1930 in Hamilton County,

Indiana. Their two children, Philip Francis Bradford (1934–2019) and Gloria Louise Bradford (Lovemore) (1938–2007), were both born in Indianapolis. By 1940, the family had moved to Greenfield. It appears that they moved back to Indianapolis sometime during the 1950s. Helen died on 1 December 1972 in Greenfield.

Lavaughn B. Parish was one of Nolan Parish's sisters. Lavaughn was born on 7 April 1894 to Elbert Sherman Parish and Cynthia Smith Parish in Rush County, Indiana. She grew up in Greenfield, where she graduated from high school. She then attended Indianapolis Business College. The 1920 census lists her as working as a clerk in a department store in Greenfield, but her obituary states that she was working in the offices of the Big Four Railway Company in Beech Grove until illness prevented her from continuing there. She died on 31 December 1921 in Greenfield.

Samuel McGrew Johnson was born on 2 June 1821 in Ohio to Jonathan Johnson and Ann McGrew Johnson. The family moved to Shelby County, Indiana, by 1830. In August 1850, Samuel married Zelda Ann Spurrier (1826–1906). They made their home on a farm in Shelby County and had four children: Florence L. Johnson (Rock) (1850–1947); Louesiana Frances Johnson (1852–1853); Viola M. Johnson (1855–1935); and Frank E. Johnson (1865–1949). Samuel died on 3 November 1867 and was buried in Morristown.

Florence L. Johnson Rock was born on 8 August 1850 in Shelby County. In April 1874, she married Charles M. Rock (1850–1927). They had one son, Charles Samuel Rock (1879–1943). The 1880 census lists the family in Henry County, Indiana, and in 1900 they are found in Indianapolis. By 1910, they had moved back to Morristown. Florence died in Greenfield at the home of her grandson, Charles Welborn Rock, on 14 November 1947.

Charles M. Rock was born on 7 October 1850 in Hancock County to Charles Rock and Lucinda Stratton Rock. The 1880 census shows him working as a farmer in Henry County. The 1900 census lists him as working in the real estate business in Indianapolis. After moving to Morristown, he is listed as a farmer in 1910 and as a real estate agent in 1920. He was a partner in the construction and operation of the town's first natural gas line. Charles M. Rock died at home in Morristown on 21 May 1927.

Charles Samuel Rock was born on 12 January 1879 in Henry County. In October 1908, he married Bessie M. Gruelle in Morgan County, Indiana, where they were still living in 1910. Their son, Charles Welborn Rock (1910–1998), was born there in Bethany Park. By 1920, they had moved to Indianapolis, where Charles Samuel worked as a clerk in a grocery store. By 1930, he and his son were shown to be living with his mother, Florence, and her sister, Viola, in Morristown. Charles Samuel Rock died on 20 January 1943 in Morristown, survived by his mother and son.

Charles P. Zike was born on 4 March 1868 in Shelby County. In 1900, he was living with his father and stepmother in Morristown and working as an agricultural supply salesman. He married Bertha Hess (1874–1962) in April 1902 in Indianapolis. They had two children, Mildred Doris Zike (Slack Steele) (1904–1983) and Herbert Eugene Zike (1909–1986). They made their home in Morristown, where by 1910, Charles was in the grocery business. He was still listed as the proprietor of a grocery store in the 1940 census. Charles did retire sometime before he died on 23 October 1948 in Morristown.

Joseph Addison Zike was born on 1 July 1873 in Shelby County. In January 1895, he married Lydia Earl Wrenick (1875–1933). At that time, he was the editor of the *Morristown Sun* newspaper. At the time of the 1900 census, the couple were living with her parents on Main Street in Morristown, and Joseph was working as a printer. In 1910, they still lived with her parents and Joseph owned and operated the Morristown grain elevator, which he continued to do through at least the time of the 1930 census. Lydia died on 23 January 1933. At some point, Joseph married a second time to a woman named Fannie. He served as choir director for the Morristown Methodist Church for forty years. Joseph died on 1 March 1940 at his Morristown home.

Arabella “Belle” Linville was born in July 1862 in Morristown to David Linville and Anna Mariah Kynes Linville (later Zike). As a young woman, she taught in Greenfield schools but spent most of her life in Morristown. Belle died in a hospital in Cincinnati, Ohio, on 2 May 1941. She left an estate estimated at \$70,000, which included 487 acres of land in Shelby, Hancock, and Rush counties, primarily to nieces and cousins.

The Adams Sisters: This collection includes a 1917 photograph of three girls identified as Elizabeth, Mary, and Katherine Adams. These daughters of Samuel Berton Adams and Anna Hasson Adams were born in Ohio but were neighbors of Ralph Boots and family in Hancock County at the time of the 1920 and 1930 censuses.

Elizabeth Emily Adams Julian was born on 12 February 1906. In April 1939, she married Ora Vernon Julian (1903–1948) in Hancock County. They lived in Greenfield where she worked at the public library and he worked in a life insurance office. In 1950, she was still working at the library. She was widowed and her widowed father was living with her. Soon after this, Elizabeth moved to Indianapolis where she worked for the Indianapolis Public Library, and Samuel moved to California. Elizabeth died on 16 February 1963 in Indianapolis.

Alice Katherine Adams Jackson (sometimes listed as Katherine Alice or Alice Catherine) was born on 24 September 1907. She married Charles Robert Jackson (sometimes listed as Robert Charles) (1911–2000) in September 1934 in Shelby County. By 1938, they had moved to Pasadena, California, where their two children, Marjorie and Larry, were born. Katherine Alice Adams Jackson died on 22 November 1986 in California.

Mary Louise Adams Bennett was born on 19 September 1910. She married Bernard Houston Bennett (1912–1972) before 1940, and they made their home in Riverside, California. They had two daughters, Anita and Elizabeth. By 1950 they had moved to Los Angeles County. Mary Louise Bennett died on 15 April 1999 in Fort Worth, Texas, where her daughter Elizabeth appears to have been living.

SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

This collection is composed of fifty black-and-white photographs of members of the related Zike, Johnson, Carpenter, Boots, Evans, Parish, Rock, Ramsey, Barr, and Faurot families who lived primarily in Morristown in Shelby County and in Greenfield in Hancock County, Indiana. There is also a portrait of Arabella “Belle” Linville, who was a stepdaughter of William Zike. There is a portrait of three Adams sisters, who were neighbors of the Ralph Boots family in Hancock County, but it is not known if they were related to the extended family represented in this collection. There are also four class group portraits from a school in Greenfield, where Helen Louise Parish was a student.
